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A quick ride - right around the country

Deciding to ride a horse around the entire country when you have no experience as a rider might seem a little foolhardy.

But for 31-year-old Larissa Mueller, who rode through the South Kaipara area recently on her way to doing just that, it's a way to raise money for disadvantaged youth.

Larissa and her friend Kendall Waugh decided to go shares in a horse back in 2015, even though Larissa had only been on a horse a handful of times as a youngster. During the course of that same afternoon, the decision grew to encompass a ride around the entire coastline of New Zealand.

"The ride came first. We decided to do the ride before we heard about the Leg-Up Trust," says Larissa.

But when they heard about the trust and the work it does using horses to connect with disadvantaged youths, they decided to use their trek to publicise and raise funds for the trust, setting a \$20,000 target.

The original idea was for both Larissa and Kendall to make the ride, planned to take about 18 months in total. They realised they couldn't literally ride around the coast everywhere, but planned a route to be no further than 60km from it.

They started in the South Island, with Larissa on a borrowed horse. She bought her current mare, Sprite, as a five-year-old off a South Island station only a couple of weeks into the ride.

The South Island leg of the trip took place over two summers, with Kendall meeting a man who was to become her husband along the way - and subsequently deciding not to also tackle the North Island ride.

"Then came a three-year gap, trying to figure out the right way to do it alone and earn enough money [to survive]," says Larissa.

The trained outdoor instructor began the North Island leg of the trek in Hawke's Bay in February, reaching Kumeu in June where she stopped for the winter, working odd jobs to fund the next stage of the ride.

She began again at the start of November, riding up through Helensville, right around the South Head peninsula, then on to Kaukapakapa where Helensville News caught up with her. From there she was to take back roads to Makarau and then cross farmland to the Tapora peninsula on her way to Cape Reinga, before heading down the East Coast on her way back to Hawke's Bay.

She estimates it will take another eight to

12 months to complete the ride.

In Helensville, riding up Karaka Street, she was stopped by a woman who ran out of her house to give her a snack bag for the journey.

She receives regular offers of meals and places to overnight, sleeping in spare rooms, sleepouts, caravans, barns or whatever is on offer. She carries a small tent for the nights she can't find a roof to sleep under-about half the time.

"With my background in outdoor instructing I can sleep just about anywhere," Larissa says.

"My priority is finding a paddock for Sprite. I have never yet had to tether her, and hope never to. The people of New Zealand are so generous."

Sprite has been a revelation; despite being only five when starting the ride, she has proven to be 'bomb-proof' in traffic and in towns, and able to keep good condition regardless of the demands of the ride.

As well as carrying Larissa and all the gear they both need, she wears a little donation box around her chest for impromptu donations to the Leg-Up Trust.

Larissa says naivety about what the ride held in store worked in her favour.

"If I'd known, I wouldn't have done it!" she laughs.

While she is doing the ride without backup support, Larissa's boyfriend does meet up with her occasionally - usually with some food and a change of clothes.

Highlights of the trek have included being welcomed into strangers' families and invited to take part in "random" activities like a pheasant hunt, and the privilege she feels being allowed to ride through private land. She has yet to have a farmer say no to her

No more building at museum

Helensville Museum has been prohibited from putting any new structures on its site because the land it leases from Auckland Council used to be a rubbish tip.

The museum has now joined forces with Te Awaroa Residents and Ratepayers Association (TARRA) to fight the council.

The museum committee recently sought to install a shipping container on its site to house items which were deteriorating from being left outside.

It took several months and numerous communications to obtain consent for the container, but the council has also told them they cannot put any more structures on the grounds – effectively ending any plans for expansion.

During the process of obtaining consent

for the container the museum was additionally told it could not even plant trees on the land, and that gardening activities should be restricted.

Extra storage facilities are desperately required for the museum's collection, and the council's decision is a new challenge for the museum volunteers who are already battling to save the collection from a bug infestation.

A second issue highlighted by the council's stance is the museum's boundary fence. The northern boundary fence is currently 10m inside the area the museum leases, but the council's ban on digging any holes on the former tip site means the fence can no longer be shifted to make more room for expansion.

riding across their land - and often receives an invitation to camp in a woolshed or similar for the night as well.

"It's kind of like all of New Zealand is our support crew."

She has also been joined on a number of occasions by groups of other riders who tag along for short stints - a welcome change from always riding on her own.

It hasn't been all good times, saying she has had three "near-death" experiences, and at one stage on the South Island leg both she and friend Kendall got very depressed.

Larissa made a rule - if she ever decided she wanted to quit, she had to wait two days before acting. Needless to say, she hasn't given up.

"I've never been as happy as doing this," she adds.

When her long trek is over, Larissa says she will be keeping Sprite. And as for the future?

"I'll sleep a lot, then get depressed, then start planning something else!"

New community constable

For new Helensville community constable Melissa Haven, taking on her role in our town is a bit like a homecoming.

Her family is from the Kumeu area, and while she spent most of her childhood being raised in the Bay of Islands, she moved back here and spent her secondary school years at Kaipara College.

She now lives in Helensville with husband Liam - also a local police officer and a member of the Helensville Volunteer Fire Brigade - and their two pre-school children.

When Melissa left Kaipara College to join the police she became at the time their youngest female recruit, aged just 17.

She was attracted to the police for its camaraderie and team work, the fact that every day on the job is different, and also the fitness aspect.

Armistice Day

At the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, a 'band of brothers' proudly wearing medals and watched by a small gathering of the public, marched from the Kaipara RSA to the War Memorial Cenotaph, where an Armistice Day commemoration ceremony was held, followed by the laying of a wreath by RSA president Les Coste. Wreaths were also laid at the Helensville service cemetery and the Parakai Cenotaph.

She says the job was a challenge in the beginning, adding that police officers are exposed to things the general public never see, and it's important to talk through those with fellow officers.

Melissa spent her first five years as a frontline constable stationed at Henderson, then a year relieving as a community constable at Massey. For the last 10 years she has been based at Kumeu - the final six of those as a community constable.

She has also been working with the

Rodney Family Harm team, dealing with domestic violence cases.

Being a local she feels she has a lot to offer the area, adding it's a definite advantage that many people know her through links built in the local community through schools, the fire brigade, sports, and socially.

Melissa says her day-today role is about being the 'face' of Helensville Police and building trust in the community. Locals will see her on foot patrol around the area, talking with local businesses and being approachable for locals to talk about any issues.

She is looking at holding semi-regular 'coffee with a cop' sessions at local cafes, so people can pop in and have a chat about whatever is concerning them.

Melissa is impressed with the wide range of volunteer community organisations in the South Kaipara area, and is looking forward to working alongside them.

Her community constable role also involves being the police liaison officer for the South Kaipara Community Patrol - a group she is passionate about getting more locals involved with.

"The Community Patrol is really valuable for us [the police], especially in a rural setting," she says. The patrol acts as the 'eyes and ears' of the police by patrolling hot spots - and also acts as a deterrent.

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


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
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New agricultural service business

After 15 years in the car industry, most recently as general sales manager for North Harbour Hyundai, Jesse McGregor has joined forces with Mike Wykes, who had been running his Kaipara Mobile Mechanics business from Glorit for the past two years after leaving John Deere dealership Agrowquip in Silverdale.

Jesse's wife Jo runs the office - although she prefers to think of herself as the 'boss'!

Now, under the Kaipara Ag Centre banner, they are providing a sales, parts and repair service for a wide range of agricultural and lifestyle machinery and equipment, based in the old Oikoumene building at 2 West Street.

In terms of repairs, Jesse says they can handle anything from a tiny weedeater motor up to the biggest tractor, with everything in between covering the likes of mowers, ride-

ons, chainsaws, farm quads, horse floats, trailers and water pumps.

Nothing is too big - Mike has previously worked in Australia on 800 tonne gold mining They are agents for Briggs & Stratton,

Victa, Dependable Oil and Vapormatic, and the business carries a wide range of spares for tractors and farm equipment, mower blades and belts, pulleys, chainsaw chains, and hydraulic parts - and even replacement cords for pull-starts.

A wide range of lubricants should cover any local's needs.

Mike says setting up the workshop from scratch was a big job, and they have been flat out since opening

Jesse is particularly proud of Kaipara Ag Centre's range of mowers, which have already proved popular sellers since the official opening on October 5, and which

includes a rechargeable, quiet electric Victa model ideal for smaller sections, plus others with push-button start and even a self-drive

He savs the aim is to beat the big box stores on price - plus anyone buying a mower gets a \$30, \$40 or \$50 voucher to go towards other products or servicing. And with that servicing all done in-house, there's a much quicker work turnaround, too.

Kaipara Ag Centre is open 8am to 5pm Monday to Friday, and 8.30am to 3pm on Saturdays.

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Alloy boat builder opens in Mill Rd

Helensville boat builder Mike Hopwood travelled half way around the world plying his trade before setting up shop in Mill Road.

Born and raised locally, Mike got his first taste of the boat building industry straight out of Kaipara College, starting by sweeping the floors for Craig Ross at his Calibre Boats

business in Whenuapai.

Mike served his boat building apprenticeship at Alloy Yachts International in Henderson.

Then a friend, as a joke, tagged h i m o n a Facebook post for a boat building job in China. Mike got the last laugh - he applied for, and landed, the job.

He has spent the last four and a half years working in China for the company which built the jet boats for Quaenstown's

for Queenstown's Shotover Jet company, returning recently to Helensville with new wife Jenny and a baby in tow.

While in China Mike had spent a couple of years, in his own time, designing an alloy fishing boat, with friend and naval architect James Hakes making up the build blueprints for him, work which involved extensive computer modelling covering things like buoyancy and stability.

Mike, a keen fisherman himself, had always dreamed of designing and building a fishing craft.

Two months ago he opened Pelagic Boats at 69 Mill Road, spending the first month setting the business up and then started building a 7.1m alloy boat for local

engineer Bryce Canter, of BSC Engineering.

Mike has longtime friend and skilled welder and engineer Shaun Wright working for him. All the alloy components were cutusing a computercontrolled CNC machine.

Once the craft is finished, by February next year if everything goes to plan, he intends to create jigs off it to make future boats using the same, size-scaleable

design easier to construct.

"I can't believe no-one has done this before," says Mike of setting up a fishing boat building business in Helensville, adjacent to one of the largest natural harbours in the world.

He admits it's a "bit of a risk whether there will be enough business" locally, but believes once this first boat is in the water word of mouth will see orders rolling in.

Helensville Library will only be closed on the statutory holiday days, and open regular hours otherwise. It will be closed on

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
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Free A&P Show trade stands

TARRA AGM

A proposal to work with Helensville Museum on council-related issues was well received at Te Awaroa Residents and Ratepayers Association's AGM on Wednesday, November 20.

TARRA chair Holly Southernwood raised the issue of the Helensville Council Service Centre no longer having a direct dial phone number - now people must phone the council's central call centre and be transferred to Helensville - "if the operator could identify the existence of Helensville," savs Hollv.

"Now the council call centre has no knowledge of any phone number to connect to Helensville, leaving us having to actually go to the service centre.

The comment from service centre staff is 'people don't talk to people now, the world has changed'. Does this signal the imminent end of Helensville having a service centre?"

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As the weather warms and the pollen count rises, if you are like me you will be getting a bit snuffly at this time of year.

medical centre notes

Hay fever is a common ailment, particularly at this time of year. It is where a person has an oversensitive/allergic reaction to particles in the air, triggering a response from 'mast' cells to release histamine - this is what causes the symptoms of the allergic reaction. It's a similar process to seasonal asthma, but affects the upper airways instead of the chest.

Hay fever can affect the nose - allergic rhinitis - or the eyes - allergic conjunctivitis. Both can be seasonal or perennial.

The triggers are often pollen, but can also include many other things from chemicals to pets, and can be made worse by cold weather or air conditioning.

Hay fever is managed, not cured, often by avoiding the trigger if possible and through medication. Avoid using decongestants; while they work well in the short term, the longer they are used will cause rebound congestion of the nose.

Antihistamines are the mainstay of treatment, with non-sedating medications such as Cetirizine and Loratadine. Less systemic options include mast cell stabilizing eye drops such as Patanol, or steroid nasal spray such as Flixonase.


Helensville Town Centre Improvements Start in Early 2020

Work starts on the first stage of these improvements in early 2020; most of the work involves planting street trees in dedicated spaces, which will also have a planted area around them and seating.










The association has budgeted to work with businesses and council to continue town centre improvements across our district where there are opportunities to work with body corporates or companies on main street improvements.

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

from the frontline

Hi everyone, my name's Melissa Haven and I'm your new Community Constable, based here in Helensville.

With summer fast approaching it's timely to talk about Muriwai Beach and Woodhill Forest. While the main part of Muriwai Beach is policed by Kumeu staff, Helensville staff police the northern end, which runs from Rimmer Road through to the top of the beach at South Head.



Already we are seeing an increase in calls to police about driver behaviour on the beach, and illegal fires being lit on the beach and in the Regional Park and surrounding forest.

The following rules apply when using Muriwai Beach:

- A permit is required when driving on the beach. Driving on the beach without a permit is a breach of council bylaws and may result in a fine of up to \$20,000 upon conviction.
- Drivers must follow the road rules. Vehicles must be registered and warranted, you must hold a current driver's license, and abide by the posted speed limits. Police will - and do - issue infringement notices on the beach.
- Vehicles are not permitted in the back dune area or in the forest, which is privately owned. Vehicle have a destabilising impact on the back dune system, which has already been damaged by vehicular activity. Vehicles are also a significant risk to a number of unique and regionally-threatened species.
- Woodhill Forest is privately owned and no one should be entering the forest without prior authorisation from the owners.
- Lighting fires is prohibited at all times in the Regional Park, on the beach, in the back dunes and in Woodhill Forest this is especially important as the weather heats up.
- The Defence Force area land at the northern end of the beach, commonly called the 'bombing range' is a prohibited area at all times and people are not permitted to enter. There is the very real risk of people encountering unexploded ordinance which could seriously harm or kill them.

And finally - don't forget you are sharing the beach with families, children, fishermen, dogs and horses, so please be safe and considerate of other beach users.

as frustrated as I am with the mixed results. In a democracy, you cannot have an organisation spending billions of ratepayers dollars that appears not to communicate with, engage with, or be accountable to the community that funds it.



It's now almost two years since the Local Government Commission released its report on the North Rodney breakaway application. We have yet to see meaningful progress on the recommendations which included better engagement and communication; Local Board offices in Rodney so our community has better access to our meetings and Board members; and a balancing of the funding inequalities we have compared to other parts of Auckland due to Rodney District Council constrained ability to fund facilities. I would like to see these recommendations be acted upon over the next 12 months.

Over the last five years, the population in Rodney has grown by over 10,000, making us the second-fastest growing ward in Auckland. This growth is set to continue. The Local Board must ensure we are focussed on meeting the needs of our growing towns while not neglecting our rural residents - this requires thoughtful balancing.

I look forward to continuing the excellent work of our previous Chair and the Local Board to maintain productive relationships, consensus and a focus on delivering results for all Rodney residents.
