KKK snowboarder aiming for Winter Olympics

Kaukapakapa snowboarder Christy Prior has her sights set on the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia after returning from a successful season competing in the United States and Canada.

That was the 23-year-old's first taste of top-level international competition, and she came away with some impressive results.

She gained first place in the Burton US Open Rail Jam in Vermont; first in the Slopestyle and Rail Jam sections and winning best overall trick at the Billabong

Flaunt It in Canada; and a first at the Breckenridge Spring Fever Slopestyle in Colorado.

Christy received several other placings in top events, and took out the Nixon Best Overall Style award at the Billabong Flaunt It finals in California.

With six years of snowboarding behind her, Christy was predominantly a 'rail rider' but has trained hard to move into slopestyle. which combines rails with jumps.

Before heading overseas she had notched up some top results here, including winning the Auckland Big Air invitational women's division and coming best overall out of the men's and women's divisions - at the time her career best.

Now she's back home in Kaukapakapa briefly, able to spend some time pursuing other interests such as yoga, skating, surfing, horse riding and tennis, before heading down to Wanaka in the South Island at the end of this month to train over our winter season.

She'll return home mid-October, before heading back to the United States for the Northern Hemisphere winter.

"I will be based in Colorado but will be traveling all over the States, Canada and Europe to competitions as it's Olympic qualifying year.

"You have to be doing back to back winters if you want to keep up with the rest of the competition, especially when the New Zealand season is [only about] three months when the States seasons can be as long as eight or nine months, plus then they have glacier riding to train on through the summer also."

Christy is currently without a world ranking, but that will come as she competes on the Olympics qualifying circuit.

For now her goal is "to get experience at the 2014 Olympics and peak at the 2018 Olympics [in Pyeongchang, South Korea]. "To qualify for this, first the NZ team had to

Is Helensville dying?

A wander along Mill Road and Commercial Road might have you wondering that, with the large number of vacant commercial premises.

As we went to press, at a rough count there were nine empty business premises in our main shopping street. Some of those have been empty for a long time, while others - like the recently vacated Computer Solutions store - are prime spots that really stand out.

In Mill Road, it's not so much businesses that have closed down leaving empty buildings behind, but rather new buildings which have been unable to find tenants. There were at least 10 empty commercial spaces there, which must be hurting their developers.

I spoke to one long-standing local business person, who described Helensville's future with a term I can't repeat here - I'll substitute the word "shot" for the one he used. He reckons Helensville is now little more than a place for people to sleep.

He had anticipated the north-western motorway extension would bump up business here as people bypassed Westgate, but says if anything the opposite has happened. And he was full of woe for Helensville's future once the new Westgate town centre opens.

He also felt many people moving into our area aren't really concerned with becoming part of our community - they are happy to live here because property is relatively cheap, but they still want to work and shop in the city. The figures do tend to bear that out too - at the last census (2006) Helensville had the highest proportion of workforce in New Zealand commuting outside its area - 39 percent.

All that said, I certainly don't think Helensville is dying. It's going through a bit of a slow patch, like much of the rest of the country. There are quite a few vacant commercial premises in Huapai and Kumeu too, and I suspect it's a theme you would find many smaller New Zealand towns.

However, our town is going to have to adapt. Everyone can do their bit by supporting local businesses as much as possible. Perhaps we need more choice - if you have suggestions for retail or commercial businesses the town needs, email me at dave@helensvillenews.co.nz. - Dave Addison, Editor

The planned lecture theme about collectables in the Helensville Museum collection has been postponed.


About 50 people enjoyed the first of the

Kaipara College motocross riders have distinguished themselves at the 2012 Schools MX Championships at Ardmore in South Auckland.

The school team of Michael Thompson, Josh Frogley, Louis Sluiters and Anna Lawton finished sixth overall out of 76 teams from around the North Island, and were only beaten out of the fifth spot taken by Kings College - by a single point. They were also only four points behind the tied third and fourth placed schools.

Individually, each Kaipara team member came away with at least a top-five placing as well.

Anna was first girl overall and third in 13-16 years 85cc Novice class. Michael placed third in 12-14 years 125/250cc MX class, Josh fourth in the 250cc Novice class, and Louis Sluiters placed fifth in 250cc Novice class.

Michael and Anna also competed at the Hauraki Plains

Invitational schools tournament at Huntly Motorcycle Club. Michael finished 8th overall out of 39 competitors. He had fourth and seventh place finishes in two races but only managing a 19th in another race where he had a crash. Anna was fourth girl and 25th overall in her class.

Michael, Anna, Louis are all year 10 students while Josh is year 9. Michael has been competing since he was 12, but Anna has only been competing for about six

months. Louis and Josh don't compete regularly at motocross; most of their riding is around their farms, so enter novice classes.

In April Michael (14) travelled to Timaru with another local rider, Phillip Lawton, to compete at the Backflips NZ Junior MX Nationals at the South Canterbury Motocross Club. It was a three-day national event, with some Australian riders competing as well. Michael had bike problems there and his best race result was a 13th. He finished 19th overall in 12-14 years 125cc class.

Phillip, who went to Kaipara College last year but now works at Bikesport in Helensville, is 16 and finished 16th overall in the 15-16 years 125cc class.

Michael competes at motocross most weekends. He rides at Rodney Motocross Club and travels to other clubs as well. He is currently second in the junior club points behind Phillip. He hopes to compete again at Junior Nationals next year, which will be held in the North Island



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Rail museum open in 12 months

The Helensville Railway Station Trust plans to have its new museum open within 12 months at the latest.

The exterior of the building in Railway Street is finished, and now the trust needs to raise another \$45,000 to complete the interior fitout, parking area and landscaping. The total cost of the project is expected to be around \$120,000.

The building will be fully insulated and carpeted, and

around one third of it will eventually house Ross Hughes' model of the Helensville station as it was in the 1940s, as shown in last month's Helensville News.

There will be a meeting room, called the Roy Monk Room, which it is expected will be available for local groups to hire. The rest of the interior will be divided up into sections depicting various aspects of Helensville's rail history, such as the Stationmaster's office and the ticketing office.

Special lighting is being designed to show off the displays, and trust members may soon tour similar museums in the north

earn extra spots for our country - each country gets two and then the chance to earn a maximum of four for each discipline and gender by doing well at comps this last season, which the girls did.

"Now this coming season its up to each individual to make it into the top 30 on the world ranks to be able to use the spots NZ now has.

"This means a lot of traveling and hard work, but hopefully it will all pay off."

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Christy is "for the most part" a professional snowboarder now, able to support herself through sponsorships mainly from Mountain Dew, Underground Skate and Electric - and winnings.

"But in the past it was full-on, working three jobs in the off-seasons seven days a week, 10-14 hours a day to fund my travel."

When she has time off from snowboarding, Christy is studying by correspondence for a Bachelor of Business degree - "slowly ticking away at it".







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
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Helensville couple run local Tough Love programme

Helensville couple Jo and Don Mead have just started running a local ToughLove group - the first new group set up in Auckland in 15 years and one of only seven in the city.

ToughLove is a support network for families that are being torn apart by unacceptable behaviour.

A completely volunteer-based, non-profit organisation, it provides education and active support to families and helps empower parents and young people to accept responsibility for their actions and to stop destructive behaviours.

With its first meeting on May 7, the local group already has eight people attending. It meets every month at the Men & Family Centre in Gerald Stokes Ave, Helensville, from 7.30-9.45pm.

Jo and Don used to belong to the Massey ToughLove group, then the closest to Helensville, which they began attending in 2008. Jo has nine children by a previous marriage, and four of them were causing serious problems.

An adult son was on P, and regularly breaking into their home and stealing things. Two younger sons, then aged 11 and 12, had serious bullying, fighting and swearing issues, while a then 14-year-old daughter was regularly getting drunk, fighting and stealing and had been expelled from every school in their zone.

"We didn't know what to do or where to go. Then we heard about ToughLove."

Don explains that ToughLove changes the way people react to things.

"By 18 months our house had turned around to be a happy home," says Jo. "Noone wanted to be at home before; it was very tough, but it's all over now."

Don says the main reason ToughLove works is the support system, which is available 24 hours a day.

"We never tell people what to do - we just give them ideas so they can choose for themselves."

After two years in ToughLove, parents are given the chance to give something back to the group and community by becoming reps.

Both the Meads have now gone through rep training. Jo is currently a co-ordinator, while Don has just been elected to the Auckland region board - and is keen one day to be on the national board.





One disappointment for Jo is the lack of representation by Māori in the groups. Māori herself, she would love to see more Māori taking advantage of the support systems on offer.

After the initial meeting, parents who want to continue attending pay a one-off fee of \$40, which Don says basically covers the cost of the manual. From then on, they can attend as many or as few meetings as they need until their family issues are resolved.

Some get all they need after only three or four weeks, while others may attend for months. Children are not permitted at the meetings, which are for parents or caregivers only.

medical centre notes

June is the final month for free flu shots. We have had a good uptake, but if you have been contacted by us and not made your mind up, please call and let us know if you want it or not. We also have flu injections for anyone who doesn't qualify for a free one but would still like to be immunised against the flu. The cost is just \$32 - cheaper than a week off work and in bed!

As men get older, the prostate often enlarges benignly (non cancerous). This can cause mechanical pressure on the urethra (exit tube for the bladder), which causes men to experience a hesitancy in starting to pee regularly, a deterioration in the flow of urine and dribbling and incomplete emptying of the bladder. At this stage options to improve the flow are - medication initially and then surgery to relieve the pressure from the prostate.

With regards to prostate cancer screening, you may have read in the media how there is no national consensus on a definite screening program.

At the Kaipara Medical Centre, we follow Australian Urology Society recommendations: a baseline PSA (prostate specific antigen) blood test in the early 40s, then an annual PSA test and physical examination of the prostate between the ages of 50 and 70. This is because PSA blood tests are not enough on their own and that the trend of the PSA tests is more indicative of disease than one-off levels. An important point is not all people with a raised PSA have prostate cancer and not all people with prostate cancer will have a raised PSA.

If men have family history of prostate cancer or suspicious symptoms they are tested more regularly. Those people with a high PSA for their age will have a repeat test within three months, and if the trend is increasing will then be referred to a specialist for a scan and/or prostate biopsy. Helensville rugby teams have winning start to season

The Helensville Rugby Club's senior and junior teams have been producing some great results so far this season.

The Helensville Under 20 rugby team, the PGG Wrightson Bulls playing in the President's grade, has had an outstanding start to their season, winning their first five games before suffering their first loss to Massey in late May. At the time of going to print they were top of their competition ladder.

The Century 21 Western Pioneers Premier team played its first championship round game against Northcote on May 19 at Helensville and won 42-10. The game was featured on Sky Sports' Grass Roots Rugby programme, with the Western Pioneer's exciting back play admired by the commentators.

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
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Waimauku cleans up in interschool triathlon

Days' for locals Sculpture

A series of three 'sculpture fun days' will be held during the July school holidays at the Kaipara Coast Sculpture Gardens.

Sculptors Ekarasa Doblanovic, Jennifer Kipfers and Sally Lush will introduce participants to their art work with a tour around the sculpture trail, followed by a digital presentation on how they make their installations and then a demonstration of techniques. Participants will then get to create their own artwork in collaboration with the sculptors -

work which will be publicly displayed in the sculpture gardens as part of the Exhibition 2012.

The three days, on Friday, July 6, Saturday, July 7 and Sunday, July 8, are being held with support from Auckland Council, and aim to bring a wide range of people together to engage with art.

'The 'have a go with sculpture fun days' are an exciting new way to spend a creative day of hands-on sculpture making," says curator Sally Lush.

On the Friday, Ekarasa will run an 'Imagine the land' project. Participants will create a site-specific land-based sculpture using found materials, mud, leaves etc as part of a worldwide art project that creates a connection between people and the environment through art.

On the Saturday Jennifer, known for her 'graffiti knitting' or 'yarn bombing', will show participants how to create works utilising fabric, wool and plastic bags. Prior knitting experience isn't required.

The Sunday will feature Sally, who creates sculptures and installations by manipulating everyday utilitarian materials, which show participants new techniques and create a collaborative work.

The days run from 10am to 2.30pm with a break for lunch and are suitable for all ages. Children 13 and under must be accompanied by a caregiver. The cost is \$30 per person which includes a light lunch with tea and coffee and a visit around the sculpture gardens.

This is a joint communication from the Helensville District Health Trust and Peacemakers Trust who co-hosted Chris Ennis from CERES in Melbourne last November. The community presentation and weekend workshops were well attended and supported. Over the ensuing weeks until Christmas, interest continued to grow and we have been amazed at the diverse nature and level of activity that is already happening in our rural community.

So where to from here?

A steering group of community volunteers met in November and December 2011 to progress some of the inspiring ideas that were developed over the weekend. There were some quick wins identified. Wood cutting / selling for winter, planting of The Verge, orchard pruning / planting lessons. Activities centred around learning more about sustainable gardening. We would like to sincerely acknowledge and thank all those people who contributed to the wonderful vision and energy that was created. The challenge now is how to put this into practise.

You will be pleased to hear that Peacemakers Trust has made significant progress on the wood cutting / firewood enterprise. Just before Christmas there was a ceremonious cutting of a very large old (but dead) pine tree. The tree cutting, chopping and stacking has already actively engaged and employed some young men. The work and learning combines to be very productive. The objective is to be able to supply dry wood to some of our elderly folk for their winter fires. Work starts this month on new college building

Work is expected to start this month on the new social sciences block at Kaipara College. As *Helensville News* went to print, the school was awaiting final approval from the Ministry of Education on the tender, financing and project plans for the \$1.4 million construction project.

The initial stage of the project will see the demolition of the remaining three 1970s prefab classrooms in the centre of the school and the demolition of the old science block.

The new building will include five classrooms, a social science faculty office and a resource room. It will stand on the site of the old science block and will be similar in design to the new English classroom block opened by Prime Minister John Key in February this year.

Principal John Grant expects the new building to be completed in time for the start of the next school year.

It is the final stage in what has become an almost total rebuild of the school, featuring a new gymnasium, science block, drama suite, English department and rebuild hall.



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

It's not wasted...

In the food business we are always trying to get ahead of a major cost factor - wastage. Buying in ingredients for a dish is a decision not taken lightly, and they are run through a test: how many portions will I get for my outlay? What will be the final selling price? What can I do with this item if it doesn't sell? How else can I use it to avoid waste?

For many years I operated Cafes, open during the day to provide breakfast and lunch. It was very hard work but the hours were more conducive to raising a family than restaurant hours. A popular breakfast item was croissant, either served with coffee and jam or filled with bacon, avocado etc and served hot. The bakery that supplied us preferred to have a standing order and would deliver a set number every morning. Many days we would sell out but sometimes we would be left with a few unused croissants that by the next day would be stale and unsaleable.

Waste caused by loss of quality before being sold is a problem that requires lateral thinking. The unsold croissants were thrown into a bag in the freezer until we worked out a way to use them. In the end our solution created a need to actually order in even more croissants daily and we never threw another one out.

Croissant and Butter Pudding

6-8 stale croissants (often you can buy old ones at a discounted price) 1 cup dried apricots 1 cup sultanas 100g butter 1 litre milk/cream 6 eggs 1/2 cup sugar Few drops of vanilla essence Icing sugar to decorate

First, soak the dried apricots and sultanas in boiling water and set aside to swell up. This will take a couple of hours, or better still soak over night.

Cut the croissants into 10mm slices

Line a cake tin or pie dish with baking paper, put a layer of sliced croissant in the

bottom and drop on a few knobs of butter, dot a few apricots about and a few sultanas. Add more croissant slices, butter and fruit and keep layering until you have reached the top of the tin.

Whisk together the eggs, milk/cream, vanilla, sugar and any liquid left from the soaked fruit.

Pour the egg mix onto the croissants until it almost reaches the top of the tin. Now most important, let it sit on the bench for 10 minutes while the oven heats to 170° C. The liquid will soak into the croissants so before putting it into the oven, use a fish slice to press the croissants down into the tin so that the liquid comes to the top again. If it is too dry add a little more milk/cream to moisten the top.

Bake for approx 60 minutes until you can see that the custard has set.

Either serve it hot straight from the tin or leave it to cool then refrigerate until the next day. Once cold, cut it into squares, dust with icing sugar and serve with a coffee.
