Skydivers get their boogie on

Eighty skydivers from as far away as Dubai and Australia, and from around New Zealand, took part in a 'Weekend Boogie' event based at Parakai Airfield over Waitangi weekend.

The annual event, run by Parakai-based Skydive Auckland, is part of the company's drive to promote the sport of skydiving, and to provide an opportunity for hobby skydivers to get together at a fun event.

Two x-turbine aircraft spent the three days taking off and landing from the Parakai Airfield, where skydivers jumped from 13,000 feet over Skydive Auckland's regular drop zone, as well as onto both Muriwai and Browns Bay beaches.

Over the entire weekend there were 59 aircraft loads and a total of 761 jumps, of which 672 were sport (or solo) jumps and 89 were tandem jumps. Some flew in wingsuits, others joined up to form large circles in the sky.

The record for most jumps over the weekend went to Seb Wagner, who completed 23 jumps.

Company merger will be boost for Helensville economy

The Helensville economy is about to get a boost with a major expansion to farm supply company PGG Wrightson.

The company will close its Kumeu branch around the middle of this year, and merge all its business, staff and amenities with the Helensville store.

Land has been purchased in Mill Road - where Helensville Hire used to be located - and a new, purpose-built building is to be constructed. Once finished the local branch will move from its present location behind Mitre 10 to the much more visible road-frontage site. A move date has yet to be finalised.

PGG Wrightson group general manager for retail and water, Stephen Guerin, says all local staff will be retained, and Kumeu staff will all be transferred to the new Helensville store.

The new combined team will service the same area as the two separate stores did previously.

Stephen says the company, which has 95 branches nationwide, made the decision on the merger around Christmas time as part of a review of a number of stores.

"The nature of rural towns is changing," he says, pointing out that Kumeu is no longer a rural, farming community. There were other issues to consider as well, such as the high volume of truck traffic entering the Kumeu property and the associated traffic issues in the area.

He sees the stores' merging as a vote of confidence in the future of Helensville, and the move here as a "natural progression" from Kumeu.

Stephen says PGG Wrightson is currently working through planning for the new building and the various council and regulatory consents required.

A more definite date, and a cost for the merger, will be revealed later.

Of the 80 skydivers taking part, 28 jumped over Muriwai Beach on the Friday, while 40 people jumped into Browns Bay on the Sunday. They landed on the beaches around 7pm, providing an impressive and exciting sight as the colorful parachutes approached at high speeds, before landing gently on the sand.

Top skydivers, including Kate Vaughan and Maria Dmitrienko who hold world records or are national skydiving champions, attended the event to pass on their knowledge to sport skydivers, covering a range of skills.

editorial

I've been a photography steward for the Helensville A&P Show for more than 30 years (!), and it's been interesting to see the changes in locals' photography over that period.

The average quality of the photos entered has improved dramatically, especially those of children, and I put that down to the advent of digital photography, which enables people to take many more photos than they used to, and to try things out without the high cost of developing and printing.

There's a downside though. At its heyday, the A&P Show attracted up to 1000 entries. In recent years, that dropped to around 500 on average, partly because of restrictions placed on the number of entries allowed. But this year, entries were only around 300, and I suspect that is part of a trend where people nowadays don't tend to print their photos.

I am constantly amazed at how few people even make back-up copies of their images. Many people use their smart phones for much of their photography, and hardly anyone I know copies those photos to their computer or some other safe-storage device. If the phone dies or is lost, those photos are gone forever.

In the 'old days' you had a negative, and a print. Lose one, and you still had the other.

Today, people are putting their history at risk - their own family history, and also that of public events, landscapes, buildings...

Museums and libraries do a wonderful job of protecting our recorded past with their collections of photographs. Just call in some time to Helensville Museum and see its vast archive of historic local photographs. But what might happen in another 100 years, when many of the photos taken today have been lost, simply because people didn't either print them, or keep safe copies?

So folks ... make sure you keep those photos safe. Copy them from your phone, or camera, to your computer. And then back-up your PC to external media so you have another safe copy. It's not difficult or expensive - and it'll protect your memories.

First sections on market

The first sections in a new subdivision at Parakai are already on the market, although it's expected to be October before they are issued titles.

The six, 600sq.m. sections have been listed by Harcourts in Henderson, and will cost \$437,000 including GST says realtor Edward Ching.

The first stage of the subdivision, which will be accessible through Chic Gardens, off Parkhurst Road, will have more than 60 sections in total, with sizes up to 650sq.m.

Helensville News first reported on the planned subdivision in 2014. At that stage development fell through, but the project was picked up last year by Legacy Property, which has since on-sold it to another developer who did not wish to talk to the press.

Assuming the development follows its original plan, a second stage will eventually see more sections added to the south, and a through-road linking in to Fordyce Road.

Currently, the site is being built up with fill being trucked in from outside the area.

New SeniorNet option

The Kumeu branch meets in St Chads Church, Huapai - and there's a Helensville outpost at a private home in Garfield Rd.

A day-long music festival will be held at Parakai later this month. 'Chill in the Ville' will be held at the Parakai Springs hot pools from 10am to 10pm on Saturday, March 25.

John Alfred (Jack) Hannam April 22, 1934 - February 5, 2017

A moving honour guard tribute from members of the Waitemata Hunt Club, dressed in full hunting regalia, marked the funeral for Helensville's Jack Hannam, who died on February 5 aged 82.

Club members stood either side of Jack's casket and raised their riding whips, and Huntsman Nigel Tracey blew the hunting horn to help send off Jack, who was the club's patron and a founding member.

Jack was born in Grey Lynn in April 1934, the youngest child of William and Florence Hannam. He was raised initially in that Auckland suburb until the family moved to Whenuapai, where they owned a farm.

One of Jack's chores was to deliver milk around the village on his bike before going to school.

He attended Avondale College, where he developed a lifelong interest in music, learning to play the piano and enjoying classical music.

For the last 15 years or so he was a member of the Hilltop Hideaway Country Music C I u b in Helensville, and had spent an

enjoyable day there with wife Ngaere just the day before he passed away.

But Jack's real life-long passion was horses, which started when he got his first horse as a youngster. In 1949 at the age of just 15, he became a founding member of the Waitemata Hunt Club, and 60 years later became the club's patron.

At one stage he was even a jockey, racing at Ellerslie.

When Jack left school he worked as a sales rep for Motor Specialties in Wellington,

selling spare parts.

He was balloted for National Service for three months, and later joined the Territorial Forces, which he served for around 13 years. In 2012 his service was recognised when he was presented with the New Zealand Defense Service Medal by then Prime Minister John Key.

In 1961 Jack married first wife Shirley, and their daughter Kim was born while they lived at Massey. The family spent regular time at a bach at Muriwai, where Jack was a member of the both the local surf club and the golf club.

Jack also introduced Kim to horses, for which she too developed a love.

After Jack's relationship with Shirley ended, he met Ngaere at an Avondale





College reunion - a meeting that would blossom into a 44-year marriage.

Eighteen months after Jack and Ngaere met, the couple and their combined five children were in an accident which would change their lives. Driving down Muriwai beach, a tyre blew out and their car rolled. Jack suffered spinal injuries which left him a paraplegic.

He spent the final five months of 1971 undergoing rehabilitation at Middlemore

Custom chrome coming to Parakai

Expect lots of chrome and fancy paint work when up to 100 chopper motorcycles converge on Parakai in a few days' time.

The customised motorbikes will be taking part in the first Chopper Show & Shine at Parakai Springs hot pools on Sunday, March 12, the first display by the fledgling New Zealand Chopper Club.

The event has been planned as a family day out, and there will be a live band, a DJ, food and bouncy castles. In keeping with the family-friendly theme, no club patches will be allowed.

Organiser Rob Blackthorne says he expects anywhere from 200 to 300 motorcyclists to attend the show.

The bikes on display will be judged in three classes - Choppers, Baggers (which feature built-in side panniers), and Pro Street bikes. Spectators will be able to have their say too, with a people's choice award.

Rob describes owning a chopper as "a passion", and

says building a bike can easily cost upwards of \$40,000, with the more extreme designs going for \$100,000.

Choppers currently for sale on TradeMe range in price from \$15,000 to \$45,000.

The club was formed to bring owners of choppers and other custom bikes together, mostly as a social club says Rob.

The Show & Shine will run from 11am until 3pm, with a wet weather backup date of Sunday, March 26. Entry to the hot pools will be required to see the show.

Hospital and the Otara Spinal Unit. But he had something to look forward to - marrying Ngaere the following year in New Lynn.

A hallmark of Jack's life was that he never let being in a wheelchair stop him from doing what he wanted to do.

In 1974 he was part of the New Zealand team that went to the Para Commonwealth Games in Dunedin as part of the kiwi shooting team, competing in the small bore events.

He spent time with Kim at her riding lessons at the Hepburn Riding School, where he because a horse riding instructor.

In 1998 he bought an Arab horse called Waimeha Detonator, which prompted a search for a property large enough for grazing - leading Jack and Ngaere to move to Inland Road in Helensville in 1990 - their home ever since.

Jack became a member of the

Helensville A&P Association in 1993 and served as Show president from 1999 to 2001 - the only person to have served as president in two different centuries.

He and Ngaere were a familiar team in the equestrian tent on show day.

Jack was a lodge member for 50 years, first with the Helensville Oddfellows Lodge until it closed, then with the Waitoki Oddfellows Lodge.

He volunteered at the Helensville Citizens Advice Bureau for several years, and also worked voluntarily at the Otara Spinal Unit, where he would talk with people with new spinal injuries and help them learn how they could still lead a full life.

Jack and Ngaere enjoyed several holidays in Australia, and also had a timeshare at Paihia in the Bay of Islands.

Ngaere and family would like to thank everyone who sent condolences or provided support following Jack's death.



Funding challenge for local Parent Aid

A loss of funding received from the Ministry of Social Development means local community organisation Parent Aid Northwest is being forced to look at other ways to raise money.

Its first fundraiser is a quiz night at the Helensville RSA in Commercial Road on Thursday, April 6 from 7pm.

The Ministry of Social Development transferred more than \$11 million in funding from social services programmes, including Parent Aid, to support Whanau Ora

outcomes in the middle of last year.

Some Parent Aid organisations were forced to close as a result of the lost funding, but Parent Aid Northwest manager of four years Kim Gordon says luckily the Helensville-based branch had a more diversified funding model and was able to survive.

Parent Aid is currently based in the Helensville District Health Trust's Porter Crescent house after having to move, along with other organisations, from Alison McKenzie House last vear.

It provides a free, in-home service for parents of children up to the age of five. covering Helensville, Parakai, South Head, Waitoki, Kaukapakapa and as far north as

other organisations who help upskill parents.

Two new parent support workers recently joined the team in Helensville. Waitoki-based Pauline Smit works in the Kumeu-Riverhead area, while Tina Knott is based at Muriwai.

That means the local team of five can now handle 15 to 20 clients each week.

Home support workers are all experienced parents themselves. They are fully trained in first aid, police vetted, and receive on-going support and training. Kim says the organisation has a "very robust" child protection policy in place.

Tickets to the quiz night, which cost \$10 per person with tables of six people, are available through Kim. People wanting to register, or join a table, can phone Kim on 420 7002. The RSA's bar will be open for the evening, and light meals and snacks will be available from 6pm to 7pm.

A successful three-month regional trial last year of a regular Saturday morning Justice of the Peace clinic has ensured the service will become a fixture in Helensville.

The JP clinics will now be held every Saturday at the Helensville Plunket Rooms below the Helensville War Memorial Hall, from 10am to midday.

No appointments are necessary, and the service is free.



Shingles is an unpleasant condition and one that can cause confusion. Shingles is a reactivation of the chickenpox virus (varicella zoster/herpes zoster), so you cannot get shingles unless you have had chickenpox in the

After a chickenpox infection, the virus stays dormant in the body, in a nerve root. When it reactivates, it travels down the nerve and spreads to the area of skin that nerve supplies. This causes a painful, hypersensitive sensation in the skin, often for a few days before the rash appears, and can be associated with flu-like symptoms.



While shingles is self-limiting over a week, an option is to start antiviral tablets in the first 72 hours from the appearance of the rash. This may minimise the chances of the nerve pain (though the evidence for this is less clear) which can last for weeks after the rash has gone, and also has a modest effect in reducing severity in the acute phase. Also, if the shingles is on the face, it can involve and damage the surface of the cornea of the eye.

It is not clear why the virus re-activates, but it is often opportunistic if the immune system is low, such as when on some medication such as steroids or chemotherapy; when the patient is stressed or run down; or if the skin has been sunburnt recently.

You cannot catch shingles - though people who have never had chickenpox can catch chickenpox from someone with shingles.

The shingles vaccine can be used as a single booster after the age of 50, though effectiveness of the vaccine reduces the greater the age of the person it is given to.



Consultation underway

It's hoped preliminary plans for a new look Alison McKenzie House site will be available by the end of the year.

The Helensville District Health Trust has applied to the Lottery Environment and Heritage Fund for funding for the next stage of the project. This will involve six months of talking with the community about its ideas for the site, as well as employing specialist architects to create concept plans.

Alison McKenzie House on the corner of Commercial Road and Porter Crescent has been closed since May last year when engineers deemed it unsafe. The Trust and other tenants have been in other accommodation ever since, while many conversations have been held with council representatives, heritage architects and structural engineers about the best way forward.

Trust General Manager Sue Miller says "this next stage is exciting because in consultation with the public we will be able to create a facility that will meet the community's needs for the next 30 years."

The community will likely be asked for its thoughts from June, with preliminary plans ready to put to council by December.

At 103 years, John Old lived up to his name

John Old arrived in Helensville in 1967 as manager of the then Union Bank of Australia

(now ANZ Bank), and for nearly 45 years was a prominent and well-loved citizen of the town and district.

His long life ended on February 1, when he died aged 103 at Rawene, where he had lived in his daughter's care for several years.

John was born at Waitara in 1913, and brought up on farms in Taranaki and the Bay

of Plenty, an experience which stood him in good stead as a rural banker. He was educated at Taneatua Primary and Whakatane High School. One of his teachers there was Gordon Russell, who was Mayor of Helensville when John arrived here.

John joined the Taneatua branch of the Union Bank of Australia when he left school at 16, and rose quickly through the ranks, working in Christchurch, Wellington head office, Te Awamutu and Gisborne. While in

Wellington he met Joyce Robinson, who he married in Te Awamutu in 1946. Their daughter Adrienne was born in 1955

In 1962 the family moved to Gisborne, and five years later to Helensville.

It was at Te Awamutu that John joined the Lions Club, continuing his membership at

Gisborne, then joining the recently formed Helensville Club. He remained a member for 55 years.

John was an active and dedicated Lion, holding all offices at club level and was also a zone chairman. In 1988 he was awarded a Melvin Jones Fellowship - the highest award available to a Lions member - and in 2001

> was made a life member of the International Association of Lions Clubs.

> John became a life member of the local St John Ambulance, the Helensville Fire Brigade, and the A&P Association. He was also a member of the bowling club, the Board of Trustees at Kaipara College, and the Businessmen's Association.

> As an accountant he audited the books of many local organisations for free. He was highly respected as a banker, and with his

farming background had an understanding of local needs.

But without a doubt John will be remembered as Santa Claus.

He filled that role for around 20 years with thought and sincerity. He not only rode in the


Overall entry numbers were down by almost 40 percent in the photography section this year, but all the new classes received good numbers of entries.

Santa Parade handing out sweets, but for several weeks before parade day would don the costume and walk up and down Commercial Road greeting locals and giving out lollies. When John's death was recorded on Facebook, many of Helensville's 'once young' responded with their tributes to Santa Claus.

John and Joyce moved to Rawene in 2011 to be near their daughter. Joyce died two years later with John continuing as a loved member of the hospital community for four more years. A memorial service to honour him was held at St Matthews Church, Helensville on Wednesday, February 15, conducted by Rev Felicity Smith, with organist Greville Walker.

Tributes were paid by his daughter Adrienne, Dennis Cummings for the Lions Club, Patsy Carlyle for St John Ambulance, and Rick Croft for the A&P Association. Patsy spoke of John's dedication to St John from the time of the first ambulance in 1969 until he left the town more than 40 years later.

Among his many hobbies, John was a passionate gardener - and a perfectionist. In paying tribute to his work with the A&P shows, Rick Croft brought along two of the show's cups. John's name appeared regularly, along with Kitty Russell, another legendary gardener.

John will be remembered as a kindly and considerate gentleman and family man; for his daily cigars, his friendship and interest in people, his community involvement - and his role as Santa Claus.

Butternut Red Curry

We have several friends who are vegans or committed vegetarians, so its great to be able to turn out a really tasty meal that anyone would enjoy, meat eater or not.

We are coming to the end of official summer so expect to see butternuts and pumpkins beginning to ripen in the garden and to appear in the shops. The curry below is something my partner makes. Its quick to assemble and cook. You can substitute any number of vegetables, from courgettes to cauliflower, and its a good way to serve tofu.

We eat this with our usual greens and herb salad, and while we still have them fruiting, fresh tomato salad with avocado - this is lovely with toasted pine nuts or cashews sprinkled on top. Just large dice (10mm) everything and squeeze on some lime or lemon juice.

■ Butternut Red Curry with Tofu

- 3 tablespoon red curry paste
- 3 tablespoon oil
- 2cm piece of chopped fresh turmeric
- 1cm piece of chopped fresh ginger
- 2 teaspoons fish sauce (check with your guests).
 - or salt to taste
- 2 kaffir lime leaves
- ½ cup chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1 medium butternut diced
- 2 cups peas (fresh or frozen)
- 1 pack of tofu (250-300gm), diced
- 1-2 cups coconut cream or coconut
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional)



In a wok or wide pan, stir fry the curry paste, turmeric and ginger over a low to medium heat for five minutes. Add half a cup of coconut milk and the kaffir lime leaves and simmer for several minutes, stirring frequently. At the same time par-boil the diced butternut in a separate pot until al dente.

Add tofu and simmer for about five minutes and the sauce starts to thicken. Add remaining coconut milk, butternut, peas and sugar (optional) and add the fish sauce (or salt) to taste. Cook for another minute or two, add chopped basil leaves, and serve with rice.
