Students really dig planting at Kaipātiki Reserve

More than 150 senior students from Helensville and Woodhill schools, and Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Te Raki Paewhenua on the North Shore, planted more than 2000 trees and shrubs at Kaipātiki Reserve in Parakai in late August.

Heavy rain the night before had made the paddock behind Te Whare Oranga rather swampy, but the children delighted in planting the natives, which included titoki, karamu, mingimingi, cabbage tree, kahikatea, kanuka, pukatea, kawakawa, whiteywood, harakeke, and kōwhai.

The planting was part of Te Poari o Kaipātiki ki Kaipara's restoration programme, which is part of the management plan for the Kaipātiki Reserve (formerly Parakai Recreation Reserve) upgrade.

They partnered with the Auckland Council's Million Trees Programme to fund the plants for this season. Combined with a community planting day in July, more than 4700 plants in total have gone in the ground. Representatives from the programme were on hand to teach the children the species' names and how to go about planting.

Jane Sherard, chairperson of Te Poari o Kaipātiki ki Kaipara, the cogovernance entity that oversees Kaipātiki, was also there helping the students with the planting.

Most of the plants came from Wainui-based supplier Scrub Growers, and South Head-based contractor Eli Foreman, who owns Native Tree Services, will undertake the plant maintenance and helped with preparation for the planting days.

Hall, RSA to close for half a year

Helensville War Memorial Hall will be closed for approximately the next six months.

Major construction work to deal with water-tightness issues, earthquake protection, and fire safety improvements are due to start in September on the hall and RSA building.

The work, which is planned for completion in February next year, means the hall and meeting rooms will be closed while the work is underway.

"Unfortunately this will mean this important community asset won't be available and this will be inconvenient to all," says

Rodney Local Board chair Phelan Pirrie. "We appreciate your understanding during this time, and look forward to having a safer, improved facility reopened in 2023."

The Kaipara Memorial RSA rooms will also be closed from October 14 for the remainder of the work.

The Helensville library and council service centre will be open throughout the remedial works, but may have to close for short periods - possibly at short notice - due to dust or noise.

Vote

I can't make the message any simpler than that.

Voting for the election of our Auckland Council - Mayor and local Councillor - and Rodney Local Board starts on Friday, September 16 and runs up to election day, October 8. Eligible voters should receive their voting papers by September 21 at the latest.

There are two things most people like to do - complain about the government, and complain about local government (and their rates bill in particular). So this is your chance to have your say on the latter. If you don't have your say, you don't really have a right to complain...

We've got an election feature starting on page 8 where candidates for the position of Rodney Councillor, and those standing for the Kumeū subdivision of the Rodney Local Board, give us their electioneering best. There are a lot of candidates this election - five for the councillor's job and 11 standing for the Local Board, so there is a lot of choice for once. Most, but not all, candidates chose to take part in our feature.

If you have specific subjects that particularly interest you, ask the candidates directly and see what they are offering. You should be able to contact them by email or telephone. Ask them each the same question (or questions) and see what responses you get.

I would ask that when you do vote, don't just follow your own self interests. Think about what's going to be best for our area as a whole, and also Auckland as a whole. It's easy to be parochial and just think about our little neck of the woods (and sure, we do want the best possible outcome for the South Kaipara) but we are part of the 'super' city after all.

It's also important to remember that, even more so than with central government, there is a limited pot of cash to go around. Yes, we all want better roads, better this, more of that... but that all costs money, and no-one wants to pay more rates. I'm sure there are lots of cost-cutting efficiencies Auckland Council could make that would help, but just remember to be realistic in your wish list.

Scholarships for business, commerce students

Students at Kaipara College are eligible to apply for one of three \$2000 study scholarships towards an undergraduate Bachelor of Commerce or Bachelor of Business Studies qualification.

If multiple entries are received from individual schools, those schools may be asked to select one student as their lead finalist. The top finalists will be invited to an interview at UHY Haines Norton's head office in Henderson. The three winners will receive their scholarship certificates at their school prizegivings.



CAB moves into new home

Helensville's Citizens Advice Bureau has a new home.

It moved to its new premises at 16 Commercial Road - the same building as the Helensville dentist - on August 1, following a request from its previous landlord to move

out to make way for a new

retail shop.

The CAB had been at its previous location since 2008, and for 17 years prior to that located in the offices of the old Helensville District Council on the corner of Rata Sreet and Commercial Road.

The bureau's new building is bright and airy and much more spacious. There are sound-proof rooms for clients' privacy, while the volunteers are appreciating greatly improved toilet and kitchen facilities.

Bold signage and a more visible location make it easier for the public to find, plus parking is better and there is increased space, which makes it easier to have community groups meeting in the rooms.

The location isn't quite as central as the previous one, which was directly opposite the WINZ office, but is still within walking distance, and provides a more private entry for clients, with a modern and roomy

reception area.

There is space enough to invite people to drop in for coffee and a chat or a private interview with a trained volunteer.

The volunteers love it.

"Having volunteered at the Helensville Citizens Advice Bureau long enough to have seen the bureau's three different locations, the latest shift has got to be the biggest and best location ever," says Dawn Bayliss.

Other volunteers see more potential use and community connection with the spacious and modern premises.

Helensville CAB is now fully open following Covid's disruption over the past couple of years. Volunteers are trained to give help and advice in the following categories: consumer; employment and business; family and personal; government and law; health and well-being; housing, land and environment; money; and travel and transport.

Anyone interested in volunteering with the CAB - those with good listening skills, empathy, the ability to ask questions, and research the answers - can call into the CAB to pick up a form to register their interest.



Butcher focuses on local produce

"Local, local, local."

That's how Andy Cummings sums up his new River Valley Meats butchery at 27 Commercial Road, where the Helensville

CAB used to call home (see separate article on page 3).

Almost everything he sells in the store, which opened in mid-August, is produced locally, and even the walls of the shop are decorated with huge photographs of his local suppliers.

"It's all local. We have the best beef and lamb farms in the area," says Andy. "That's what I'm passionate about."

Andy, who has 20 years' experience in the food industry and has lived in Helensville his whole life, stocks Bradly Beef and Whenuanui Kaipara Lamb - both produced within a few kilometers of the shop.

The store's chillers are packed with cuts processed and

vacuum-packed at Andy's River Valley Meats & Kumeū Meat Processors plant. They range from premium items like whole eye and scotch fillets, through to popular products like shin on bone, chuck steak, schnitzel, gravy beef, and bolar roasts.

Alongside the beef and lamb are free range, hormone-free Bird & Barrow chicken, plus a whole range of salamis, black and white puddings, biltong, and manuka smoked salmon. Rounding out the range are River Valley Pies (made with Bradly Beef) and St Louis-style pork ribs, with items like cheeses still to come.

"I've had some good comments. People are pleased to see a butcher back in town," says Andy. "I've been really overwhelmed by the community's response.

"I've lived in Helensville my whole life, and it's been a goal to have a shop in my home town."

A keen supporter of the South Kaipara RSA and the Helensville Rugby Club, Andy describes Helensville as "a great town".

He says the River Valley Meats shop is in a perfect central location, and he's done his research, pricing everything "very competitively". His ultimate dream - and that's what it is at the moment - is to have more shops around Auckland.

"I would like Aucklanders to realise we

have top farms around here, rather than shopping for Hawkes Bay lamb or Canterbury beef."

River Valley Meats is open 10am to 6pm Tuesdays to Fridays, and 8am to 2pm on Saturdays.


At Parakai they will look into how the school has worked with its community to establish a successful Lunches in Schools programme.

It's had a slow gestation, but after a year of delays caused by Covid, Helensville's newest event is happening on Saturday, October 15 from 10am to 3pm.

It's Big Little Local, and its aim is to connect as many people as possible with local service providers and businesses.

The idea came from Harcourts the Difference real estate agent Nisha Page. When she moved to this area, she had no idea of the range of businesses and services the local area has to offer. She since realised many long-time residents aren't aware either - especially when it comes to home-based businesses.

So with branch manager Nicky Horsbrough they have organised what they say will be a family friendly, hopefully annual event, with entertainment, light food, prizes, and free business stands, which will help grow a sense of community.

Big Little Local was originally planned for September last year. It was postponed a month because of Covid, then put back tentatively to April this year, but eventually delayed until now because of pandemic restrictions.

Prior to that the library, which first opened in 1865, had been locked for 16 years, unavailable for community use.

The final opening, on Sunday, August 21, featured the Kaukapakapa Kourier newspaper, which also recently closed.

The commitment over the years has included running the Kaukapakapa Library Photo Competition, as well as a short story competition. Each December Santa has visited, complete with his elves.

Arts in the Ville is back

Arts in the Ville is back again this Labour Weekend after being cancelled last year due to Covid.

Now in its seventh iteration, the arts festival has grown to become a major event for Helensville, bringing visitors to the town over its three days.

With 45 artists and crafts people already signed up at the time of going to print, this year's Arts in the Ville, to be held from 10am to 4pm on October 22, 23 and 24, looks to be every bit as varied as previous festivals.

Many of the artists on show will be familiar from previous festivals, but coordinator Jo Ogilvie says visitors can expect a number of new ones.

As well as a chance for the public to meet artists in person and quiz them about their work, there will be live displays including pottery by Louise Wild of 'Wild and Potty' in the Whimsical Garden of Nick & Tracey Roberts, and Sharon Dooney of Jumbuck Carding will be spinning in Helensville Library.

A resident of Warkworth area for over 28 years, before election to the Local Board in 2013 Beth was an award-winning businesswoman in the transport industry, a farmer, and local business owner.

She sees the key concerns for Rodney being lack of infrastructure, poor roading, and inadequate funding. Rodney has only one councillor out of 20 in Auckland. To make progress on our issues our representative must work with a majority of councillors and the Mayor.


As councillor Beth would focus on

predominantly rural to now include residential and semi-industrial areas.

These developments are not being properly met by Auckland Council.

As your local MP, I've received views from constituents who support this proposal, particularly for sustainable energy generation, as well as from those who have concerns over environmental impacts such as the effect on




Last week I wrote to the Department of Conservation (DOC) to alert them to this proposal. My intention was to ensure any environmental concerns are given robust consideration as part of the resource consent process. With DOC having expertise in this area, it seemed appropriate to ensure any resource consent application had the benefit of DOC's evidence-based knowledge and expertise. It is reassuring DOC is taking a proactive approach to this proposal.

I encourage you to engage in any resource consent submission process to have your say on this proposal. From my experience as a MP, when a high volume of submissions is received on an issue it sends a strong message to those receiving the submissions to take a carefully considered approach and not to routinely move forward for the sake of following a process.

Whatever the outcome of this proposal, any resource consent submissions preceding the decision requires democratic procedures to be followed and that the Council are held to account by ratepayers for a fair and thorough process. This can't occur without you, so please take the time to have your say.

local board matters

The political term is winding to a close with Council elections in October.

This term has been overshadowed by the pandemic and the dramatic effect this has had on Council budgets.

While other Local Boards faced projects being delayed or cut we have managed to deliver progress on transport infrastructure through our Rodney Transport Targeted Rate. We launched three new bus services linking our rural community to the Aucklandwide public transport network. Two of these services are now being paid for and run by Auckland Transport. We have approved \$24m to deliver 35 footpaths across Rodney. 11 of these locally. Some of these have been built, and others are either underway or to be constructed over the next year. We have completed a park and ride in Warkworth and last month approved the delivery of another one in Huapai.

On the environmental front, \$1.5 million has been invested into riparian fencing and planting in partnership with farmers and landowners, match funded to result in over \$2m of restoration work. It's gratifying to see this work is now being prioritised for funding by Council and central Government; next term we can turn our attention and budgets to other issues. We have continued funding support for volunteers running pest-free initiatives.

For Helensville and the surroundings area there's been the completion of a new playground in Cabeleigh Drive, new pedestrian crossings outside schools, footpaths and town centre improvements which are ongoing.

Parks and community facilities are core business for the Local Board and it has been our primary focus to ensure delivery of great parks and facilities for a growing community.

Vexing issues such as the state of our roads and their poor maintenance are the financial responsibility of the Auckland Council governing body - our councillors. We have, as we do every year, urgently requested councillors prioritise spending on road maintenance and renewal.

Auckland Transport itself says not enough money is going into roads, and hopefully next term councillors can take this issue with the seriousness it deserves.

This will be my last column as I decided not to stand for re-election. It has been an honour to serve the community over the last nine years.

The pace of population growth and the challenges this brings are relentless. It requires focus, teamwork, and constant vigilance to get the best outcomes for our community. I believe the current Local Board has taken a very professional approach to governance and collectively done an excellent job of getting fantastic outcomes for our community in difficult circumstances and it's been a privilege to work with them.
